
UNDERSTANDING HOW A FOOD CRISIS ALWAYS CORRELATES WITH POLITICAL INSTABILITY

Military expert speaking at American Farm Bureau's Annual Meeting a few years ago told his audience of 5,000 American farmers and ranchers, "If you keep doing what you do to feed America and the world, we won't have to do what we do in the military." He then pointed to history for proof that a country's population that's hungry is primed for unrest and uprisings. His impassioned words have stuck with me, and I've always glommed onto news reports speaking of regional famine and food price spikes around the globe. "What will happen to the country," I've lamented. One of the most recent examples of a people desperate for food was Sri Lanka.

Not just hunger but poverty, unemployment, social injustice, and more contribute to social unrest. But hunger makes us grow desperate. Geopolitical experts at the New England Complex Systems Institute identify a specific food price threshold above which protests become likely.

Marco Lagi, Karla Z. Bertrand, and Yaneer Bar-Yam, in "The food crises and political instability in North Africa and the Middle East," highlight this point in their abstract: "Despite the many possible contributing factors, the timing of violent protests in North Africa and the Middle East in 2011 as well as earlier riots in 2008 coincides with large peaks in global food prices. These observations suggest that protests may reflect not only long-standing political failings of governments but also the sudden desperate straits of vulnerable

populations. If food prices remain high, there is likely to be persistent

and increasing global social disruption. Underlying the food price peaks we also find an ongoing trend of increasing prices. We extrapolate these trends and identify a crossing point to the domain of high impacts, even without price peaks, in 2012-2013. This implies that avoiding global food crises and associated social unrest requires rapid and concerted action."

When you're hungry, you're desperate. Right now, The World Food Program USA identifies the Democratic Republic of Congo, Afghanistan, Yemen, Syria, The Sahel, South Sudan, Sudan, Somalia, Northern Ethiopia, and Haiti as the countries suffering the most from hunger.

Additionally, Dr. Alicia Ellis, Director of the MA in Global Security Program in the School of Politics and Global Studies at Arizona State University, brings home our current vulnerabilities. "The risk of food-related political crises is being exacerbated today by the Russian invasion of Ukraine, which disrupted the export of staple foods, particularly wheat and other grains. It isn't just the percentage of the world supply that is the important metric, it's also where those supplies are going. In July, Russia pulled out of the grain deal allowing those exports past the Russian blockade in the Black Sea; over half of those exports were supplying countries in the Middle East and Africa most vulnerable to food insecurity: Kenya, Somalia, Sudan, Ethiopia, Afghanistan, among others. A lot of these areas are also suffering from prolonged drought. So, we're looking at further squeezes on local farmers in these vulnerable areas, alongside shortages and higher prices for consumers. This generates tremendous socioeconomic pressures and compounds the risk of political instability."

In all of this, however, there is always hope for desperate, hungry people.

Innovation In Agriculture Helps Make the Difference

According to a paper by the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD), since 1960, global food production has increased by 390% while land use has increased by a mere 10%. Improved farming technologies that include soil and water use improvements, along with improved seed have contributed to this amazing increase in food production. These seed technology improvements also include the use of genetically modified (GM) seed development, but not exclusively as even continued traditional seed hybridization is helpful. One estimate of the impact that GM crops have had on land use undertaken in 2010 found that without GM crops, an additional 13 million hectares of land would have been globally required to produce the amount of food that was available. PRESERVING HEARING HEALTH: A GUIDE

e here at Arizona Farm Bureau want our members to protect their hearing. If you ever experience noise-induced hearing loss symptoms, remember that they may happen hours or



even days after the exposure ends. Your hearing may return, but the damage to your inner ear may still be permanent. Noise-induced hearing loss is a common condition that may be caused by a single event or continuous exposure to loud noise. This article will show you the symptoms of this condition and the importance of early detection to prevent further damage to your hearing.

About Noise-Induced Hearing Loss

Noise-induced hearing loss (NIHL) occurs when hair cells inside your ear die and can't grow back. These hair cells are damaged by a single event or regular exposure to loud sounds, possibly due to a person's occupation. In certain instances, hearing loss can be immediate, while in other cases, symptoms accumulate over time. This condition affects people of all ages, so take precautions to protect your hearing from harmful noise.

Importance of Prevention and Early Detection
