

No Fence Districts

What is a no-fence district?

In a no-fence district, Arizona's open range laws don't apply. That means that it's the livestock owner's responsibility to keep livestock off of property, rather than the property owner's responsibility.

How is a no-fence district established?

No-fence districts are established by the County Board of Supervisors. A majority of the taxpayers in the relevant area may petition the County Board and ask that a no-fence district be formed. Upon submitting such a petition, the Board will immediately record it and order the formation of the district.


Where are the no-fence districts in Arizona?




Cochise County






Graham County





Maricopa County






Mohave County


